<u>SUBJECT</u>: PUBLIC HEARING ON SUBMITTAL OF THE CITY'S 2008-09 COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) ANNUAL ACTION PLAN

BACKGROUND:

In order to receive CDBG funds, the City must submit a Consolidated Plan to HUD. The Consolidated Plan is the planning document (Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy) for the Ames jurisdiction. The Consolidated Plan requires detailed background information on the community derived both from census data and from other comprehensive studies performed by the community. The Plan must identify, over a five-year period, the goals and priorities to address the housing and community development needs of low- and moderate-income persons, as well as of the **non-**low- and moderate-income persons in the community.

Additionally, the Consolidated Plan requires that the City must develop an **Annual Action Plan** that outlines the program activities that will be undertaken to address or meet those goals and priorities. The Annual Action Plan can address one or all of the goals and priorities of the housing and community development needs identified in the Consolidated Plan.

The regulations require that the Annual Action Plan be submitted to the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for approval within 45 days before the beginning of the program fiscal year (on or before May 17, 2008). Prior to the submittal deadline, the regulations also requires that the Plan be made available for a 15-day comment period (April 25, 2008 to May 13, 2008) to allow for citizen input on the proposed project(s).

On January 17, 2008, the City received notification from HUD that for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2008, the City will receive \$479,690 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds. This represents a \$20,505 reduction in comparison to the 2006-07 allocation.

Of this amount, \$383,728 is available for programming and \$95,932 is available for administrative expenses. In addition to the \$479,690 of new allocated funding, it is anticipated that approximately \$734,788 of 2007-08 rollover funds along with approximately \$163,950 of anticipated program income will be included for a total program budget of \$1,372,428. Below is a table outlining the 2008-09 Annual Action Plan program revenues and expenditures:

The *Renter Affordability Program includes the following subcomponent programs:

- Deposit Assistance Program
- Transportation Assistance Program
- Childcare Assistance Program

The **Neighborhood Sustainability Program includes the following subcomponent programs:

- Acquisition/Reuse Program
- Lease to Purchase Program
- Slum and Blight Program

In regards to the Human Service Campus Project, negotiations are underway between United Way of Story County and representatives of the First Evangelical Free Church for purchase of the property.

The funding proposed for the Housing Activities (Neighborhood Sustainability Program, Neighborhood Housing Improvement Program, and Homebuyer Assistance Program) is 38% of the funding available for program activities. Staff acknowledges that this does not reflect the 51% priority for Housing Activities set by City Council at its March 27, 2004 goal setting session. However, all of the activities proposed are of benefit to low- and moderate-income persons. This meets the primary objective for the use of our CDBG funds, and will help to **exceed** HUD's requirement that at least 70% of all program funds received during the first 5 year Consolidated Plan (2004-2009) be expended on programs that directly benefit low- and moderate-income persons.

On March 5, 2008, staff hosted public forums to inform the public about the overall CDBG Program and to solicit their input regarding the proposed 2008-09 Program activities. Eight (8) citizens attended these two sessions. All attendees were receptive to the proposed Action Plan projects. To date, no comments have been received.

ALTERNATIVES:

- 1. The City Council can approve a resolution approving the submittal of the City's 2008-09 CDBG Annual Action Plan with the projects presented above.
- 2. The City Council can deny adoption of a resolution approving the submittal of the City's 2008-09 CDBG Annual Action Plan as presented.

MANAGER'S RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Therefore, it is the recommendation of the City Manager that the City Council adopt Alternative #1. This action will adopt a resolution approving the submittal of the City's 2008-09 CDBG Annual Action Plan reflecting the above projects and required certifications to HUD on or before May 17, 2008.

The ISU Extension Story County office is located on the Story County Fairgrounds in Nevada, Iowa. It is the desire of our elected nine member Extension Council to open a satellite office in Ames in the not so distant future. Hopefully, space will be available at the future Human Services Campus to house our Family Nutrition Program (FNP) Assistant and a 4-H Youth Assistant.

The classes are taught in a family participant's home or in a group setting. I am writing this letter in support of the City of Ames using block grant (CDBG) funds for the proposed Human Services Campus to be located at the current Evangelical Free Church location in Ames.

As you know, RSVP offers adult volunteers aged 55+ quality opportunities to share their skills, interests, and life experiences in response to a wide variety of community needs. RSVP also coordinates Volunteer Management for Disasters (requiring additional rental of space for storage and training). For nearly 70 public, non-profit, or health care organizations, RSVP staff process volunteer requests, promote volunteer needs, recruit and refer volunteers, and follow up on volunteer placements.

Although we currently have adequate office space in Ames, being part of a Human Services Campus would be a tremendous benefit, both to our volunteers and the agencies we serve. RSVP volunteers often come to our office, either for an orientation, an "interview" with an RSVP staff person, training for a specific assignment, to pick up or drop off materials, or just to visit. Many would be able to access the services of other agencies at the same time.

RSVP is currently collaborating with several of the agencies considering space in the Human Services Campus, including Heartland Senior Services, Red Cross, United Way, and the Volunteer Center. Being housed in the same location will only strengthen those partnerships and make connecting with their much easier.

In closing, it is also important to note that a Human Services Campus would offer much more cost-effective space than we currently enjoy. Having the ability to share certain amenities (i.e. conference room, break area, etc.) with other organizations will reduce space needs and possibly reduce equipment costs.

I am writing to you to express my support and the Richmond Center Board of Director's support for the use of community development block grant funds for the Ames Human Services Campus.

As you know, the Richmond Center is the designated non-profit community mental health center for Story County. As such, the Richmond Center provides mental health services to the residents of Ames and Story County from our Ames office. A large portion of our clients are those who qualify for Medicaid and other low-income residents, who are not served by the for-profit mental health providers in the community. Many of our clients have a long-term, chronic mental illness. Additionally, the Richmond Center also serves many clients with private health insurance and has agreements to provide employee assistance program services with Iowa State University and Mary Greeley Medical Center.

Over the past few years, the Richmond Center has begun to see a less favorable financial picture, as the percentage of Medicaid clients that we serve has increased. Many community mental health centers throughout Iowa are facing similar financial struggles at this time.

We hope that a move into the Ames Human Services Campus will provide the Richmond Center with good office space that is less costly than our current space, thus helping us remain viable for the low-income clients that we serve. We also hope that the newly remodeled campus space will be designed with better sound-proofing than our therapists currently have, thus helping us better maintain confidentiality for all of our clients. Having space in the campus building will also free our administrative staff from having to spend significant time on building cost and maintenance issues, freeing up more time for mental health issues, which is what we do best.

With the less costly and better space in the Ames Human Services Campus, the Richmond Mental Health Center staff will be able to continue better serving all of their clients.
