FOOD SERVICE LICENSE HOLDERS FORUM AND SURVEY RESULTS

March 22, 2011

Background:

During the budget deliberations, Council directed staff to conduct a survey of local restaurants to determine their support for continuation of a locally conducted food service provider inspections program. Council directed that staff utilize the Chamber of Commerce for contact with the food service providers. On February 22, 2011, Department of Inspections and Appeals (DIA) Director Rodney Roberts informed the Council of his decision to terminate the State's contract that allows Ames to conduct food service inspections within the City limits. Prior to making a final decision to pursue special legislation or an administrative appeal of the DIA Director's decision, the City Council directed staff to solicit customer input regarding this issue in a timely manner, using both a survey and hosting one or more customer forums.

Possible survey questions were presented to Council on Friday, February 25, 2011. Utilizing the Council's input, a survey was established on a web site. A letter from the Mayor was mailed to approximately 300 food service license holders located in Ames (Attachment #1). The letters summarized the actions of the DIA and requested their participation in the on-line survey and at a forum held in Council Chambers on March 15, 2011 The Chamber of Commerce also emailed the Mayor's letter to their members from the food service industry.

Public Input Results:

Attached for you review is a summary of the comments garnered at the March 15, 2011 forum (Attachment #2) from nine attendees and the on-line survey results from 107 respondents (Attachment #3).

Forum Input

Of the 9 individuals who attended the forum, 7 indicated a preference for local inspections, while 2 had no preference.

On-line Survey Input

Of the respondents who had experience with both state and local inspections, 35 preferred local inspections and 9 had no preference.

In terms of the frequency of inspections provided by the City, 80 respondents believe that twice annual inspections is sufficient, while 16 feel twice annual inspections are excessive.

In terms of the frequency of inspections provided by the State, 36 respondents believe one annual inspection is sufficient, while 60 feel an annual inspection is not sufficient. In addition, 13 respondents believe inspections every two years is sufficient, while 83 feel inspections once every two years is not sufficient.

In regards to a recommendation to the City Council, 69 indicated that the City should retain local inspections, 12 expressed a preference for the State to conduct inspections, and 14 had no preference.

Dear Food License Holder:

For 31 years, the City of Ames has contracted with the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals (DIA) to conduct food service inspections within the city limits. Under the leadership of our City Sanitarian, Kevin Anderson, the City has been able to inspect food service establishments twice per year.

Recently, the Director of the DIA has notified the City that the State intends to take over food service inspections as of July 1, 2011, in conjunction with Kevin's announced retirement date. While the Department of Inspections and Appeals currently conducts restaurant inspections in other parts of the state on an average of once annually, the DIA Director informed the City Council that the inspection cycle could move to once every two years based on a new "risk based inspections" system.

Whether the inspections are conducted by the City or State inspectors, there should be no difference in the direct cost to food service providers. Both programs are partially funded by revenues from annual licenses. However, in addition to the license revenues, the City has traditionally subsidized this inspection service with property taxes. This subsidy would be eliminated with the return of the inspection responsibility to the Department of Inspections and Appeals.

Before the Director of the DIA's decision becomes final, the City Council would like your input regarding this important issue. To assist us in gathering your feedback, a simple and short on-line survey has been established at <u>http://www.surveymonkey.com/s/cityofamesfoodservicesurvey</u>.

I would appreciate you completing the survey by March 15, 2011. In addition, a public forum regarding this issue will be held on Tuesday, March 15, 2011, at 3:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers at the Ames City Hall, 515 Clark Avenue. The City Council will then review the feedback we are able to collect at its next regular meeting on March 22, 2011.

Input from Meeting with Restaurateurs on March 15, 2011

There were nine attendees and two from the press.

- It was said that on the same day that some of the restaurants got the letter from the city about the survey, they also got a letter from DIA explaining that they will be taking over inspections after June 30. How will the state handle temporary food stands? We tend to be seeing more and more of these stands popping up. Will they all be inspected? What is state policy?
- Someone questioned if we were the only city that had their own inspector.
- Concern of the potential for state inspector being subject to political pressure and cut backs.
- How much would the average household save if we did not have the Sanitarian position? For a residential property owner, the general fund subsidy is \$1.38 per \$100,000 of taxable valuation.
- Who will do garbage truck inspections? Unsure at this time.
- If the state is rationalizing part of the reason to take over inspections is because there are two inspectors that live here, they (the state inspectors) have other responsibilities also. Ames has always had a go to person that responded quickly to concerns and problems, including floods and fires. Will we have a number for someone that will respond to our needs and concerns as quickly with the state run inspections?
- Frequent turnover in staffing in the food service industry, so there is a need for greater training. Right now the Sanitarian takes time to talk with us and train us when he's there. He may take a bad situation and make a learning experience out of it.
- The national average says that about one half of all Americans meals are eaten out of the home. In Ames, that may be an even larger number with all of our students and professional households. Ames has a lot of restaurants and institutional food providers. With the food sciences and hotel motel program Ames has the potential for negative publicity if there were to be problems. In Ames, if one establishment has an issue, it reflects on all other establishments. There is a huge risk without a City Sanitarian position.
- There is, and has been, a mutually beneficial relationship with the City and ISU Food Safety Programs. They have worked together in the past and the Sanitarian has even had students come to inspections to answer/ask questions for a great learning experience.
- Right now inspections at food service establishments are completed every six months, and they are thorough and give a good opportunity for management and employees to learn and ask questions. There is a mutual respect and a good working relationship. There is a great concern about the frequency of these inspections going down.
- If the inspections are done by the state, there is not a guarantee that you will have the same inspector each time. This potentially can give us "mixed messages". One inspector may not interpret the code the same as the next and we may get conflicting inspection reports.
- The current Sanitarian is very thorough with his inspections and he takes the time needed to do them properly. Experience with the state inspectors gave this person the feeling that they were rushed, that the state inspector was there no longer than 10 minutes for the whole inspection.

- With the amount of food service in Ames, there is a need for continuing education, and if that won't be through a City Sanitarian, it will need to be available.
- There was the statement that right now this person "feels comfortable dining in Ames....and doesn't feel that way everywhere"
- Concern that what could be a minor problem at a six month inspection cycle could potentially turn into a major problem with a one to two year cycle.
- View food inspections in Ames as a positive thing. Learning experience.
- One person gave an account of a restaurant that she knew that was done by state inspectors that had run into some newsworthy problems. She said that the state did a nice job in dealing with the press for the restaurant and for helping them to correct what was wrong.

7. Food License

Funding for the food service inspections comes from annual license fees established by the State of Iowa and paid for by food service establishments. The revenue received from food service annual licenses is not sufficient to cover all the costs of Ames' locally operated inspections program. Next year the General Fund (property taxes) will subsidize \$60,066 of the Sanitarian's program. If the State were to assume the responsibility for food service inspections, there would be a property tax reduction that all citizens would share. The annual license cost to food service businesses will be equal if either the State or City conducts food service inspections.
